




Population Served by Race/Ethnicity







Strengthening parent leadership and the voice of underrepresented families.

Striving to create a countywide, powerful base of advocates that champion young children and is led by those most harmed by inequity.

Support and Partnership: a tailored, leadership curriculum towards a shared vision for a diverse and inclusive community



Technical assistance: advocacy, research, and strategic planning



1:1 coaching: building concrete skills to move folks to action



Broader political education: the systems and history that have shaped communities and impacted young children



Advocacy: community-based approach with focus on root causes and structural inequities



Housing: engaged **over 2,500** residents in advocacy—including Antioch CHANGE housing assessment



Parks: two more park renovations, totaling **\$10.7 million** invested for park renovations



Informing Public Policy: including **3 local housing and park policies** and 1 statewide policy
